There's a new nonprofit organization in Wauneta, its mission is to provide nourishing food to hungry children throughout the world.

Mercy Meals of Southwest Nebraska allows volunteers to package nourishing food that will be delivered by the Orphan Grain Train to children in need throughout the world.

The southwest Nebraska chapter of Mercy Meals is based in Wauneta. Volunteers are busy remodeling the house just north of Sinner's Paint and Body Shop. The house will become the

organization's base of operation in southwest Nebraska.

The efforts to get Mercy Meals of Southwest Nebraska up and going have been a community effort. Volunteers have completed all of the work to the house so far.

Because the initial use of the house was donated, the organization had very low startup fees. They have hopes to purchase the house in the future.

So far, the organization has received \$4,500 in cash donations in addition to many donations of building supplies, materials and many hours of labor to get the operation going.

Organization leaders have already purchased enough food to make 12,000 meals. The food packaged is highly nutritious and carries a cost of only \$0.10 per serving—which includes food and packaging materials.

“We can feed 100,000 people for only \$10,000,” said Pastor Greg Stuckwisch, one of the Mercy Meals volunteers. A donation of \$10 would purchase the food and supplies needed to provide 100 meals.

Once Southwest Nebraska volunteers package the food, it will be shipped free of charge by the Orphan Grain Train to those in need.

The food is shipped both internationally to places such as Haiti, India, the former Soviet Union, but it is also shipped domestically to places including an Indian reservation in New Mexico.

The organization still needs volunteers. Those interested in helping with the renovations to the house should call Laurie Kerchal, the project manager at 308-394-5180.

The total anticipated start up expenses for the organization is \$20,000 which includes purchase of the facility, food and utilities.

Once the organization is up and going leaders anticipate the yearly operating expenses for the facility to be approximately \$3,000. The remainder of any donations received will be spent on the purchase of food.

“A donation of \$7.50 per month would feed someone for an entire year,” explained Long.
