Similar to the 2012 fair, temperatures this year never exceeded 85°F, making for perfect conditions.

Fair board president Dave Schilke said the cool weather played a big role in the success of this year's fair.

The conditions helped boost crowds on Friday and Saturday. "We had great crowds on the grounds those days," he said.

Overall, Schilke said it was another successful fair. "I've had a lot of positive comments. People said it was a great fair."

Crowd numbers strong

Crowd numbers at the Christian family show, demo derby and both grandstand shows came in really strong, according to Alex McNair, the fair board's entertainment chair.

Wednesday night's Christian family show featured Laura Story, an accomplished artist in Christian music circles.

McNair said Story drew around 950 people to the show, making it one of the largest Christian

shows in a number of years.

McNair said the fair worked with the Ministerial Association of Southwest Nebraska to take the Christian show to a new level. That goal was accomplished with Story's appearance, he noted.

He said the two entities share a common goal of growing the Christian family show every year going forward.

Pastor Phil Harris of the Wesleyan Church challenged those in attendance to make it the most attended show at the fair.

McNair said it drew a lot of people to the fair that night. He said he's received nothing but good comments about Story's message through her music.

The demo derby turned in another great show as well, with more than 1,200 in attendance.

A total of 27 entries participated in the event, making it one of the larger derbies in the area.

McNair said the Styx concert Friday and The Talbott Brothers and Justin Moore shows Saturday night drew great crowds as well.

Going into the weekend, it was the Styx show that had sold the most tickets. However, before Saturday night was done, The Talbott Brothers and Justin Moore sold the most tickets.

McNair said 2,250 tickets were sold for Styx, representing 60.2 percent of capacity. Saturday night sales totalled 2,378 tickets, representing 63.6 percent of capacity.

McNair said good weather helped walk-up sales both nights.

On Friday night, more than \$8,000 in tickets were sold at the ticket office. On Saturday night, that number exceeded \$14,000.
